Feedback: Studies reveal that Hispanic Americans are reluctant to seek mental health services because they believe that those services do not accommodate their cultural needs (e.g., language, beliefs, values), cost of care, and concerns regarding immigration status. Many instead seek help through supportive family services and the church. Required hospitalization, lack of 24-hour emergency services, and lack of reimbursement do not play a role.

Feedback: Demonstrating a genuine interest, avoiding assumptions, and acquiring information about the client's country are appropriate and effective actions for providing culturally competent care. Although communicating with the client in the client's native language may be appropriate, speaking the same language does not guarantee shared meaning and understanding of the client and their culture, a necessary component of cultural competence. Although facility protocols are important, a nurse who is culturally competent understands and appreciates cultural differences in health care practices and similarities within, among, and between groups and adapts accordingly.

Feedback: Generally, Asian cultures have a tradition of denying or disguising the existence of mental illness. In many of these cultures, it is an embarrassment to have a family member treated for mental illness, which may explain the extremely low utilization of mental health services. The response about the war messing up the spouse's mind, or the statement about hallucinations, reflects some acknowledgment of a mental health problem. The response about never talking about what is bothering them also indicates some understanding of an underlying problem.

Feedback: Perception of well-being and health in persons with severe mental illness has been positively associated with spirituality; the statement about being as well off as possible implies that the client has a sense of well-being despite their depression. The statement about church friends visiting reflects the client's religiousness or participation in a community of people who gather around common ways of worshiping. The statements about life not being worth living and that God is punishing them for their sins reflect hopelessness.

6. A client is being treated for prostate cancer; the prognosis is very poor. The client has a strong faith, and has been active in their church for many years. The client is concerned about their health and the challenges they faces as their cancer progresses. Feedback: To carry out spiritual interventions, the nurse enters a therapeutic relationship with the client and uses the self as a therapeutic tool. Offering to pray

with the client is the only intervention that allows the nurse to use self as a therapeutic tool. Prayer is an appropriate spiritual intervention in this situation because of the client's religious background and their need for solace and hope. The statements about taking the client to the nurse's church and belonging to the same church to get to heaven focus on meeting the nurse's need rather than the client's need. The statement about bringing a guided imagery audiotape, although an appropriate spiritual intervention, would not be helpful for this client at this time because of their poor prognosis and concerns about the challenges they will face.

Feedback: Poverty affects all cultural groups and other groups such as older adults, people with physical disabilities, individuals with psychiatric impairments, and single-parent families. Often, those in poverty become trapped in a downward economic spiral as tensions and stress mount. The homeless population is the group

most at risk for becoming unable to escape the spiral of poverty.

Feedback: Everyone has a cultural identity or a set of cultural beliefs with which one looks for standards of behavior. The client's statements reflect their cultural identity. Acculturation refers to the socialization process by which minority groups learn and adopt selective aspects of the dominant culture, eventually leading to the evolution of a new minority culture (one that is different from the native culture and different from the dominant culture). Cultural competence involves an adjustment or recognition of one's own culture in order to understand the client's culture. Linguistic competence is the capacity to communicate effectively and convey information that is easily understood by diverse audiences.

Feedback: Families experiencing poverty are under tremendous financial and emotional stress, which may trigger or exacerbate mental health problems. Along with the daily stressors of trying to provide food and shelter for themselves and their families, the lack of time, energy, and money prevents them from attending to their psychological needs. Often, these families become trapped in a downward economic spiral as tensions and stress mount. The inability to gain employment and the lack of financial independence add to feelings of powerlessness and low self-esteem. Feeling powerless and having low self-esteem have the potential to keep these individuals from trying to find employment.

Feedback: All age groups in rural areas have limited access to health care. The lack of resources is particularly problematic since most mental health services are located in urban areas because more people live near cities. Rural areas are also diverse in both geography and culture. For example, access to mental health for those in the Deep South is different from access for those with the same problems in the Northwest. Treatment approaches may be accepted in one part of the country but not in another.

Feedback: Cultural competence requires that the nurse demonstrates a willingness and ability to draw on community-based values, traditions, and customs, and that the nurse values clients' cultural beliefs. The nurse needs to demonstrate a genuine interest in, and respect for, the individual and their beliefs. The nurse should learn about the client's country of origin and culture before assessing the client. Cultural competence requires the nurse to adjust or recognize their own culture in order to understand the client's culture. It also requires the nurse to understand and appreciate the cultural differences and similarities within, among, and between groups. Nurses need to avoid assuming that all individuals of a racial or ethnic group are the same.

Feedback: The client's statement reflects religiousness, the participation in a community of people who gather around common ways of worshiping. Spirituality is a dynamic, conscious process consisting of five attributes: meaning, belief, connecting, self-transcendence, and value. Spirituality can be expressed through adhering to a set of religious beliefs. Cultural identity is an enduring, fundamental aspect of self that includes membership to a cultural group with a set of attitudes, beliefs, feelings, and behaviors associated with that group. Cultural humility is being open and willing to reflect on oneself as a cultural being and open to hearing about and striving to understand the cultural background and identity of others.

Feedback: Cultural competence, the ability to interact effectively with people of different cultures, involves a set of academic and interpersonal skills that are respectful of and responsive to the health beliefs, health care practices, and cultural

and linguistic needs of diverse clients to bring about positive health care outcomes. An approach that expands cultural competency and focuses on and fosters an appreciation of human diversity is cultural humility. The culturally humble nurse expresses openness, is egoless, and has interactions that are supportive, respecting the client's culture. The nurse does not assume competence simply based on prior experience with or knowledge of people from a similar background. Acculturation is the term used to describe the socialization process by which one (usually smaller) group learns and adopts selective aspects of another (usually dominant) culture while still retaining cultural markers such as food and language. Linguistic competence, the capacity to providing readily available, culturally appropriate oral and written language, is an important part of cultural competence. The ability to obtain, process, and understand basic health information and services in order to make health decisions is dependent on a person's health literacy, that is, the ability to use reading, writing, verbal, and numerical skills in the context of health.

Feedback: Cultural and linguistic competence are especially important for psychiatric–mental health nurses because of the significance of therapeutic communication. Uncertainty about cultural beliefs and practices can result in feelings of anxiety and vulnerability when interacting with clients from other cultures. Clients may interpret the nurse’s anxiety as a lack of caring or competence. It is important to learn and understand each client’s cultural background and identity to provide culturally competent care and avoid miscommunication and knowledge barriers. Although there may be some effect on medications, prescribing medications is not within the nurse’s scope of practice. Telling the nurse that culture is everywhere and that the world is constantly changing do not address the nurse’s concerns.

Spirituality develops over time and is a dynamic, conscious process, characterized by two movements of transcendence (going beyond the limits of ordinary experiences): either deep within the self or beyond the self. Religiousness refers to the participation in a community of people who gather around common ways of worshiping. Cultural identity is a set of cultural beliefs with which one looks for standards of behavior.

Cultural explanations do not describe the social factors contributing to a disorder. Linguistic competence is the capacity to communicate effectively and convey information that is easily understood by diverse audiences.

Feedback: Linguistic competence, the capacity to providing readily available, culturally appropriate oral and written language, is an important part of cultural competence. Linguistic competence not only refers to the appropriate use of words, grammar, and syntax, but also to the practical aspects such as choice of discussion topics, taking turns, use of metaphors, and the "hidden rules" of interactions. Although having a family member with the client during teaching may be helpful, the client is the recipient of the teaching. A certified translator, not a family member should be used to ensure the information is conveyed accurately.

Feedback: To carry out spiritual interventions, the nurse must first enter into a therapeutic relationship with the client and use the self as a therapeutic tool. Once a therapeutic relationship is established, the nurse can follow through with spiritual interventions. Examples of spiritual interventions include meditation; guided imagery; and, when appropriate, prayer to connect with inner sources of solace and hope. Making a referral to the facility chaplain or having the client visit the chapel would be appropriate if the client identified either of these as being a source of solace and hope.

Feedback: Cultural humility is a way of being and an evolution in perspective. This approach implies that the clients are the experts of their experiences, and nurses engage in ongoing self-reflection and education to gain an awareness of their own assumptions and biases that contribute to health. The culturally humble nurse expresses openness, is egoless, and has interactions that are supportive, respecting the client's culture. Thus, allowing the client to explain a typical routine demonstrates this concept. The nurse does not assume competence simply based on prior experience with or knowledge of people from a similar background. Limiting the number of questions, making decisions for the client and assuming likes and dislikes do not reflect an openness on the part of the nurse.

Feedback: The ability to obtain, process, and understand basic health information and services in order to make health decisions is dependent on a person's health literacy,

that is, the ability to use reading, writing, verbal, and numerical skills in the context of health. Health professionals should: assume that all clients (not just children or older adults) and caregivers may have difficulty comprehending health information; communicate in ways that anyone can understand, such that communication should be simplified and then comprehension confirmed for all clients, so that the risk of miscommunication is minimized; and make the office environment and health care system easier to navigate. Health literacy addresses spoken and written communication as well as self-management and empowerment and supportive systems.
